

Schwedagon Pagoda



Located in central Yangon, the Schwedagon Pagoda stands tall. Architect Okkalapa of Burma created the Buddhist structure in the 6th century. Before entering the Buddhist structure, it's required that all visitors remove shoes and socks. This is standard for all pagodas and one might consider bringing some wipes for afterwards because you're feet can get pretty dirty from walking around barefoot. Be sure to wear appropriate clothing that covers shoulders and knees.

After entering the pagoda, the traditional practice of pouring water over a Buddha is seen executed by locals. People pour the water over the Buddha placed in front of their birthday. The day someone is born is significant to his or her astrological sign. Their current age is how many bowls of water are poured over the Buddha's head. Visitors can partake in the traditional practice by pouring the water nine times and make a wish or pray. Nine is a sacred and holy number in Buddhism.

Traveler Brielle Bonetti took part in the tradition during her visit. "It was wonderful to participate in blessing the Buddha on my day of birth," Bonetti said. "It

really gave me a chance to participate in something that a passerby tourist might have missed."

The blessing is a great way to be open-minded about different beliefs. One can gain a better understanding and appreciation for the culture. "It was beautiful to see everyone come together under a common religion," Bonetti said.

The country has an endless amount of cultural learning and adventure to offer. It shouldn't be passed up when planning a trip to Asia. The unique culture and people of Myanmar are innately welcoming and travelers can fulfill a sense of adventure when visiting the beautiful country of Myanmar.
